New Practice has four core workstreams: (1) Meanwhile Use, (2) Retrofit, (3) Spaces for Communities, and (4) Community Engagement.

We deliver work across a range of scales and sectors – from identifying potential uses for derelict buildings and developing vital community facilities for local communities, to working on £1 billion masterplans and managing statutory engagement processes for international architecture

practices. Within this breath of work the four themes of Meanwhile Use, Retrofit, Spaces for Communities, and Community Engagement repeat across our projects. This booklet is part of a series that looks at each workstream in turn, exploring how it influences our approach and output.







New Practice are recognised for our ability to develop thoughtful designs and craft clever responses to briefs using a multidisciplinary and collaborative approach.

In addition to our portfolio of architectural work, over the past decade our Directors – Becca Thomas and Marc Cairns – have contributed critical research, delivered best practice community engagement and provided leadership for built environment policy across the UK.

New Practice champions creativity and openness in our industry through a number of senior appointments across our team, including: Mayor of London's ADUP II; Glasgow Urban Design Panel; Associate for Design Council; RIAS Council; and Scotland Lead for ArchitectureLGBT+.

New Practice was listed by RIBA Journal as one of their five '2022 Future Winners.' In 2023 we are nominated for an AJ Retrofit award in the Health and Community category; we will also feature as part of RIBA Design Studio Volume 7, this book will showcase how small and emerging practices can adapt, remain resilient and harness the opportunities of collective power.





New Practice

We exist to develop the community, creative and cultural capacity of cities and to connect people with the decision making processes that underpin their urban experience.

New Practice is a women and LGBTQ+ led architecture practice based between Glasgow and London. We work at the forefront of place-based practice, ensuring that community-led briefs and shared decision making shape the future of our built environment.

We work with public and private sector clients and enable shared participation through public consultation, creative engagement, temporary intervention, research, studies and strategic long-term design across the built environment.

New Practice is led by Becca Thomas (ARB) and Marc Cairns. We have an energetic, socially and politically active team who use New Practice as a platform to work meaningfully in their chosen industry.







For over a decade our team has championed reuse in the built environment, proving that this approach can provide the same impact, personality and profit as new build.

Retrofit

New Practice is a signatory of RetroFirst – a campaign led by Architects Journal to prioritise retrofit over demolition and rebuild.

We believe that the greenest building is the one that already exists, and we prioritise using resources already available to avoid build and burn. We frequently prioritise the use of local supply chains and support education and industry conversations about the climate crisis.


We believe strongly in making the most of a building's rich history and existing structure to create new functional, flexible and accessible community, commercial, creative and cultural spaces for generations to come. Across our projects our key approach has been one of adaptive re-use of existing building elements; we have reused and recycled a wide range of construction materials from two storey steel staircases to lighting fixtures and handrails.





















Kinning Park Complex was nominated for an AJ Retrofit Award in the Health and Community Category, 2023.



Kinning Park Complex

Lead architect to redevelop a rundown Edwardian school building into a community space that is functional, accessible and flexible. **What** Through adaptive re-use and internal reorganisation, Kinning Park Complex is now a multiuse community space offering community activities focused on citizenship, creativity and wellbeing – alongside workspace. The design makes the most of the existing building and its heritage while creating a vibrant new visual identity.



Cumberland Street Station


Since 2021 we have been working on a feasibility study for the conversion of a derelict train station into a vibrant new multipurpose venue. **What** The adaptive re-use of a former train station in Glasgow's Southside into a new cultural, community and commercial venue – including spaces for events, classes, and artist studios for rent. The Network Rail owned building has laid vacant since 1966 meaning its internal spaces are now in a state of disrepair. The project has been enabled through support provided by the Glasgow City Heritage Trust and the Architectural Heritage Fund.



A self-initiated market hall conversion located in the post-industrial East End of Glasgow. Transformed into a cultural hub for creative practice.

What Redevelopment of the abandoned 'Charlie's Market' building in the Barras Market in advance of the 2014 Commonwealth Games with capital development funding provided by the Scottish Government; refurbishing into a creative hub with 40 workspaces, a public gallery, events space, meeting rooms and artist residency facility alongside two commercial shop units.
